Religious Education this Fall starts September 20th from 12:00-1:00 PM. We are not meeting during service due a) our teaching volunteers will be able to attend service at this time where spirituality is a balm, b) gives parents a chance to attend Coffee Hour without having to worry about babysitting their child/ren. Classes are available for K-12 and are all online. Your child will not need anything for RE except a device.

### From the Board of Trustees

When I agreed to write this month's Board column, I was just an ordinary run-ofthe-mill Board member. Now I'm the acting Board president!

In case you missed the news, Kerry Simpson announced she and her wife, Cynthia Asprodites, would be heading off to western Pennsylvania to be with their daughter and new grandson for a few months. The lure of the grandbaby is strong! As I step in as interim Board chair while Kerry is gone, I will strive to be as calm and capable as she has been during this time of crisis. She kept such a steady hand amidst tremendous upheaval for the church.

Change happens fast, and often when we least expect it. I'm guessing after the year we've been having, all of us know about unexpected changes. About sudden shifts in plans. About trying to build a plane while we're already flying it. Whew, this has been a time.

As summer ends and (online) school begins, we confront the reality that our ability to meet together in a physical space isn't coming back anytime soon. That hope that the disease would pass quickly and we could get back to "normal" has faded. Our church life is different. Not worse. But different.

I think of a passage from the Torah where the prophet Jeremiah encourages his readers to "stand at the crossroads and look; ask for the ancient paths, ask where the good way is, and walk in it, and you will find rest for your souls." It feels like UUCB is at a crossroads, looking back to tradition, moving forward toward new good ways.

The Board of Trustees acknowledges this. We have been working to prepare for the many developments facing us as a community, trying to strike a balance between maintaining our traditional ways of being and doing and being open to the new. We

ask: how do we continue to "do church" without a building, without a shared coffee pot, without hugs and casual face-to-face conversations?

Most importantly, we ask: "how will UUCB live into its mission in the coming year?" This question is the heart of the Board's work. How do we create loving community, inspire spiritual growth, and encourage lives of integrity, joy, and service? And how do we do this not just for ourselves, but also for our neighbors who need UU values and community more than ever?

Last month, the Board explored which aspects of UUCB need to remain constant, those elements of our church life that should not be changed, regardless of whatever happens in the coming year. What, we wondered, is essential to UUCB?

Then we turned the question around. In order to work toward our mission, what aspects of UUCB need to change? As an online physically distant community, what do we need to do differently? Our fumbling first answers were sometimes practical and operational. They were definitely philosophical and aspirational. We left things out, no doubt, especially because we were speaking our individual truths instead of coming to a definitive shared conclusion.

This conversation needs to happen again and again, and the Board would be delighted to hear your answers to these questions! My fellow Board member Dave Roberts says that UUCB offers each of us "a place to refresh our energy, to remind ourselves of our shared values and to go out into the community with renewed commitment." What do you think forms the essence of UUCB? Are there traditions and norms that need to be maintained and strengthened even as we meet online? # Chalice Circle Leadership Team

#### NEW CHALICE CIRCLES STARTING THIS SEPTEMBER

Summer chalice circles have wrapped up for the season, and according to facilitators and participants alike, they were a wonderful source of connection during a difficult and uncertain summer.

Over the summer, our circles were able to serve almost 100 members of our community. We experimented with different options for how long we would meet, and the response was very positive. With that in mind, the Chalice circle leadership team agreed to rethink our offerings for the Fall.

Our team is pleased to announce the rollout of our new season, starting during the week of September 28th, 2020. We have two themed chalice circles which are tentatively being offered this year (subject to interest and facilitator availability). One of the circles is entitled "Exploring Our Own Faith and Spirituality" and the

other is focusing on the topic of Love. Both of these themed chalice circles will run eight weeks.

Chalice Circles will also now have the option of meeting for four sessions, eight sessions (four months of meetings) or the standard 16 sessions (eight months of biweekly meetings). You just need to let us know your preference when you sign up! No matter the length of a circle, the format is always the same – chalice circles are open and inclusive. They include time to check-in, but they also are organized around an agreed upon topic and have trained facilitators. ### **Endowment Committee**

On June 19th, UUCB received an unexpected and very welcome bequest of \$250,000 from the Petczo One Family Trust to go into UUCB's Endowment. Those who opened the mail couldn't believe it was real! To our knowledge, this is the largest cash gift UUCB has ever received at one time.

Further, no one recognized the name of Petczo! There was the requisite Googling which turned up some information, including a photo of Ann Lane and reference to the fact that she had a sister named Susanna Petczo.

Dick Sherman, acting on behalf of the Endowment Committee called the lawyer administering the Petczo Trust and confirmed that the Ann Lane, who had been a member of our congregation, was indeed the sister of Susanna Petczo. Ann had predeceased Susanna.

Ira Nelken, long-time UUCB member, was a very good friend of Ann's and he writes:

"Ann Lane was very connected to this church. She was deeply involved for the years she was here. She and I had lunch regularly and discussed church business. When her mother died, at 95, she decided 70 was old enough to retire and enjoy her "golden years." Within six months she was diagnosed with cancer. Her well-meaning sister took her to Boston (where they were from). We heard nothing after that unfortunate choice. The day she left she secretively tucked

a \$3,000 check for the church into my hand to take care of for her. That was so typical of Ann Lane. She was dedicated to our Congregation and Unitarian Universalism."

In addition to this \$250,000 becoming part of the UUCB permanent endowment, the Endowment Committee has proposed the installation of a



memorial panel prominently displayed somewhere within the main part of the church to honor this level of generosity in perpetuity. Our present thinking is that there be a \$100,000 threshold (perhaps adjusted periodically to account for the effect of inflation) for a name to be added to this panel. Currently, this would therefore recognize the Kay Davis gift made in 2009 and a few other past gifts and this current bequest of \$250,000. In this connection, it bears noting that several members of the congregation have expressed their intention to leave similarly large bequests on their demise in the future, as part of the **Wake Now Our Vision** project that recently concluded. Hopefully, it will be many years before those names are added to the panel, but over time more members will be motivated to do the same! In response to our update in the UUCB Discussion Group, the importance of honoring generosity – of the heart, of peoples' time, and their treasure – has received a number of important reminders from Congregants. Thus, it is probable that we will partner with the Board and ask for wider congregational participation in drawing up these guidelines!

In the meantime? We celebrate generosity in whatever form we are able to express it!

### From the Treasurer

Our financial position continues to improve as we close Fiscal Year 2019-20. We are making progress in cleaning up the books for the past years, and these corrections also reflect a more positive financial outlook. We have found several accounting errors, and are working on other improvements that will make the books easier to understand and more transparent.



This article describes results for the month of June 2020. We closed FY 2019-20 in a very good position. Near the end of June, we received a bequest from a former member, Ann Lane, in the amount of \$250,000. With this bequest, Year-to-Date

Total Revenue is now ahead of budget by \$331,413. The bequest will be deposited in a separate UUA Endowment Fund. Year-to-Date Expenses are \$75,093 less than budgeted.

The bottom line is that the Year-to-Date Surplus is \$412,880, which is \$406,506 better than budgeted, but this includes the \$250,000 bequest.

As of June 30, 2020, the Mechanics Checking account is \$504,887 and the Mechanics Savings account is \$152,585, so our cash reserves at this point are \$657,472, but this includes the \$250,000 bequest. The UUA Board Designated Endowment is now at \$781,949.

### Social Justice Council

The SJC Honors UUCB's Graduating High School Seniors.

At the August meeting, Lonnie Moseley announced that despite the social distancing and Zoom only meetings of our congregation, we raised \$2,200 for our high school grads. \$500 will be given to each of them with the remaining split among last year's grads as a supplemental boost. Lonnie asked Haley Smith, Jared Lipka, Alejandra Robins, and Elijah Fox Darquea which principle means the most to them as they begin this first stage of adult life. Alejandra said the 7th Principle - Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part. Niki concurred with the importance of the 7th Principle and said she is trying to eat less meat to reduce the stress on our planet. Jared said the 4th Principle - A free and responsible search for truth and meaning. And Elijah said the 5th Principle - The right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large. Meaningful principles that can help guide all of us in facing the challenges confronting us today. The ceremony concluded with a blessing from our Director of Family Ministry Catherine Boyle.

# The 75th Commemoration of the bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki.

The Social Justice Council hosted these events for an introspective remembrance of the bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki.

#### August 2

**Summer Forum** welcomed Takashi Tanemori to hear his story of having survived the Hiroshima bombing. People engaged with Tanemori-san with questions that would have continued the conversation beyond that day. He started the Silkworm Peace Institute, on the foundation of forgiveness. He has spent his entire life working on forgiving that his family members were killed in the bombing, sharing his piercing story with all.

The **LFDC** discussed John Hersey's famed 1946 New Yorker Magazine article, *Hiroshima*. Our discussion was active, intense, and far-reaching. We shared our emotional responses to and reflections about the stories of the six hibakusha—survivors of these bombings—with whose experiences of the bombings Hersey wove together his narrative. Members shared their own experiences of having visited Japan and Hiroshima in the past and how this impacted them. Don Klose moderated the discussion, supplementing it with some historical perspectives on the still haunting questions of what entered into the decisions to drop the atomic bombs and what were the critical factors that brought WWII in the Pacific to a close.

#### August 9

Our **Summer Forum** speaker was Marylia Kelley, who founded Tri-Valley CAREs (Communities Against a Radioactive Environment) 40 years ago. Tri-Valley CAREs serves both to oppose nuclear weapons and act as a watchdog for the Lawrence Livermore Lab, which, with Los Alamos Labs, is one of two facilities where all US nuclear weapons have been designed. Congress allotted 88.7% of Livermore

Lab's funding this year for nuclear weapons, whereas just 1.7% went to civilian science projects. Such priorities are what drive the international arms race. Under President Trump there has been a huge jump in arms funding, particularly for a large number of entirely new nuclear weapons. Trump is also promoting nuclear weapons testing, not carried out in the US since 1992. Hopeful news: In 2017, 122 UN member states voted to put forth a treaty prohibiting nuclear weapons. Forty-four countries have ratified the Nuclear Arms Ban, and when 50 have ratified, the treaty will go into effect. Kelley believes that when that many countries have come together to "ban the bomb," other nations will feel pressure to join the group and begin eliminating their nuclear weapons.

The commemorative worship service led by Reverend Michelle was intended to evoke the past, center us in the present and take us into the future. The prelude music by Katya; harp by Susan Mashiyama; and jazz by Anthony Brown gifted it with vitality. The intention of the **Big Bands Behind Barbed Wire** *E.O.* 9066 was to show the complexity of life that Japanese Americans experienced during WWII: The second generation (Nisei) were serving in the military on behalf of the USA, while their families were incarcerated in internment camps in the US, with relatives being bombed in Japan. Don Klose's homily, **Reflections on Hiroshima and Nagasaki Going Forward**, sends us into the future: WHAT will we do to abolish nuclear arms?



businesses, and the population at large felt a general sense of "What is actually going on?" We were all just trying to get through the summer without major personal upset, hoping that there would be answers on the other side. And now we have entered wildfire season. "Seriously?"

All that being said, I am grateful to have things to focus on. They may seem small in the larger context of all that is going on, but it is extraordinarily helpful for my mental health. Like Rev. Dr. Michelle Collins said last Sunday, I need my refrigerator box, my cocoon, and I'll be okay.

UUCB is my cocoon right now. Even in a pandemic, we have made progress on new revenue sources. The Music Department has offered the music/choir room to be shared space with one of our preschools. Our parking lot continues to be the weekly home of Baskit, the pay-as-you-can produce delivery company. We are entering into contract with an outdoor school that wants to use our grounds for their programming. Even the cottage is rented! So we are making progress, even when it feels very slow.

Her fresh perspective has been enormously helpful, and her support of us as people and acknowledging our struggles has been beyond validating. It's hard to do things right now. But together we are all making the best of it, even taking this time to improve our systems for the future.

As many of you know, the Coordinating Team (CT) meets on the 2nd and 4th Thursdays of the month and has been open to all congregants since before the pandemic. We are exploring the format, use, and structure of this committee, including allowing for time for input and questions outside the agenda. Although we are not there yet, this is the place where we "get into the weeds" and have discussions on how we want to do things. I will be putting this meeting on the uucb.org calendar and sharing meeting minutes to continue to improve transparency. Dear Congregation,

The last time Luminescence, our chancel choir, and I met person was February 27. The pandemic will keep us from returning to in-person rehearsal for at least for the rest of this year, and I can't really imagine us gathering as a full group again before March. It's heartbreaking, but singing brings special concerns with potential virus transmission, so we dare not hurry back.

Once the choir can begin in-person music making again – and how I long for that day! – it will be with small subsets singing in large spaces for short times. In order to ensure airflow and plenty of room for distancing, we will probably use the Fireside Room or Social Hall, maybe the Atrium or the Terrace. Neither the Choir Room nor the Sanctuary offer the best option.

And so, when Tess asked me if there was any possibility that we could rent the choir room and music office to The Good Earth School\*, I had to give the idea fair consideration. Then I consulted with the Music Committee. We all agreed, after our initial surprise and resistance subsided, that it made sense. We will not absolutely need the Choir Room for the next year, and the church will very much need the income the rental will generate.

That left us with the practical considerations of clearing the spaces and safeguarding the few corners we'd hold onto. We developed a plan, coordinated with Antonio and Tess, and boxed and cleared and moved and locked. The gamelan and choir robes now have a well-protected alcove, thanks to Antonio's ingenuity and good work. A locked cabinet has some music program essentials. Otherwise, the sheet music and supplies were boxed up and moved out - that took a lot of

effort and thanks go to volunteers from the music program and most importantly to Antonio who did the lion's share. Not everything has reached its final destination yet, but the space is clear for the school.

This is a very strange time, and for this one schoolyear, the choir will not use the Choir Room, strange as that sounds. In the meanwhile, we will zoom our way through rehearsals, and bring you our best efforts in virtual videos.

\*The Good Earth (TGE) is the preschool in the Nursery/Childcare building for the past 3 years now. There will be a maximum of 12 kids, ages 5-6 years old. The school emphasizes outdoor play and more information can be found at their website. https://thegoodearthschool.com/
