Dear UUCB Community,

I hope you are all well and are staying safe. It's a change for me to produce the OTF Beacon article, and as I write I am away from home, so I decided to write you a letter.

Unfortunately, it seems that we are in the upward portion of another spike in COVID-19 infections. Perhaps you're getting news frequently about friends and connections who have tested positive for the virus. We can hope that we will get to that downward portion of the spike soon, maybe even during July. In the meantime, I hope that we will all maintain our vigilance, in spite of being tired and cranky about the long trajectory of this virus' effect on our lives.

Please, please, please come to church in-person activities <u>only</u> if you are free of symptoms of contagious disease. Yes, this means that if you have a cold and test negative for COVID, you should still stay home and enjoy our online options—a cold is a contagious disease. Also, for your own health and the health of others, be sure you have an effective mask that fits you well. There are many ways to get an effective mask, and there's masking advice on the CDC and California Department of Public Health websites. As you know, not every mask fits every face—and it's important to make sure your mask fully and snugly covers your nose, mouth and chin at all times when indoors at UUCB (and certainly recommended at places like the grocery store, too).

Here's the other Very Important Thing: if you do test positive for COVID within four days of attending any UUCB activity in person, please notify the church. With our Sunday Check In as you arrive, and our sign in sheets for other activities, we are able to notify specifically those people who attended a particular event of their possible exposure, so that they can be alert for any symptoms they develop, or even just take a test a few days later if they are concerned about passing on the virus to others.

Board of Trustees

June 2022 Actions

COVID Vaccination: Changed from requiring proof of vaccination for large events/worship service to requiring affirmation for all events. Opening Task Force reported they had not turned anyone away because they were not vaccinated or had not received a waiver, but they had turned away people who said they were vaccinated but did not have proof with them.

Freestone: Encouraged congregants to visit to Freestone this summer, during one of the twice/month daytime outings; see Week Ahead for details.

Widening the Circle (WTC): Amended the Board's WTC vision statement to expand the types of anti-oppression to dismantle and amplify the role of our youth; an abridged vision statement to be read at Board meetings and included in the Beacon and Week Ahead.

Fire Station Parking Lot Lease: Received presentation from the Kensington Fire Protection District on its 18–24-month use/lease of the lower parking lot for a temporary fire station. They showed the layout for the engines/equipment apparatus bay, modular units for office/living space, parking, and perimeter fencing. Informed about average of 1-2 calls/day, daily schedule, employee parking, noise (minimal siren use), removal of tree branches and speed humps at Craft entrance, UUCB community engagement/pancake breakfasts, indemnification, and post-lease paving.

Ministerial Search Committee (MSC): Is underway, with Greg Lemieux as MSC liaison to the Board. Helen Tinsley-Jones and Cordell Sloan will be the Board liaisons to the MSC.

Youth Spirit Artworks

Youth Spirit Artworks continues making progress towards creating Tiny House Village 2. In recent weeks they've had meetings with Oakland's mayor and several council members, seeking support for the leasing by the City of a one-acre lot next to Tiny House Village 1, as well as \$250,000 in funding towards construction costs. UC Berkeley and USF architectural students are designing a community center for the Village as part of an international green competition. Village #2 will have three mini-villages intended to serve as possible models for mini-villages that could be built for unhoused Oakland residents on vacant lots around the city. As this project evolves, I expect there will be many opportunities for members of our UUCB community to contribute and participate. Look for further updates.

World Peace Committee's Sponsored Project for 2021-2022

My awareness of the grossly excessive expenditure for nuclear weapons in the proposed U.S. Budget prompted me to apply for a Sponsored Project, which I called "Cut the Pentagon Budget; Shift Funds to Human Needs." The objectives were to: (1) influence U.S. lawmakers to reduce our government's bloated military budget, particularly by cancelling the obscenely expensive plans to produce new nuclear weapons, and (2) move the money saved towards increasing the budgets for underfunded U.S. Departments such as Health, Environment, Education, Housing, etc. The members of our small World Peace Committee and some other SJC members agreed that this was an important issue. Don Klose agreed to work with me as Co-Chair of this Project.

I am sorry to report that, when the proposed budget came up for a congressional vote, a large majority of our government representatives approved the new military budget, which was for an even larger amount than the increases which Trump had added! So, we were not successful in reaching our objectives. But, in the future, we hope to return to methods, mentioned below, that we had planned when this Sponsored Project was written.

Last year we had hoped and expected that UUCB would be meeting in person by the summer of 2021. Don and I planned to present occasional informative talks after services to make members of the congregation aware of the subjects of this Sponsored Project. We planned to notify people of upcoming government bills related to such subjects and encourage them to write or call their elected representatives. We planned to organize occasional group letter-writing gatherings after services, and also have any important petitions available for signatures. We hoped to hold monthly Action Tables in the Atrium, wherein one of us would sit at the table, hand out info, and encourage others to sit down and write a brief letter to a government representative, and the other would roam the Atrium and Social Hall, handing out info and encouraging people to visit our table. It turned out that none of these plans materialized because of the church's long closure. And, even now, since UUCB's re-opening, the services are not very well-attended, and not many people stay around on Sundays after service the way we used to do. So, we have not felt motivated to try putting our plans into effect.

Still, we will continue making an effort to create a more peaceful world – with fewer (preferably ZERO!) nuclear weapons in the world, and more U.S. governmental funding for human needs. Don Klose and I will present a talk for Summer Forum at 9:30 a.m. on Sunday, July 17, live in the Fireside Room (and also on Zoom). And, I hope that in the future we can put into action some or all of the methods described above, plus other forms of outreach, to make significant contributions towards our original objectives in particular, and to World Peace in general.
