Hamilton-Holway. In becoming reacquainted with him, the search team has been intentional about letting go of preconceptions, allowing ourselves to come to know him as the amazing, mature, and experienced minister he has become. Rev. Marcus will preach on April 30 and again on May 7. After the service on May 7, we'll get down to the business of voting to call him into settled ministry. Stewardship Campaign Update



As the stewardship committee prepares this update in mid-April, our pledges for next year have brought us to 91% of our pledge goal. We're getting closer but we need about \$40,000 more to reach our target. Unfortunately,

Reverend Michelle's magic trick of pulling coins from a person's ear can't help us with this. By the time you receive your May Beacon, we hope to have received those additional pledges, and maybe even more! On May 3, the Board of Trustees plans to vote on a 2023-24 budget to present for congregational review and approval at our May 21 Congregational Meeting.

We tried very hard to make our pledge goal realistic: we based it on past pledging and current knowledge of our congregation. About 40% of UUCB's projected 2023-24 revenue will be provided by our pledges. If we meet or exceed our goal, we believe that we will be able to offer fair and competitive compensation to our capable and committed staff—a necessity not only for living our values, but also for retaining high-quality staff in a tight labor market—as well as paying for basic operational necessities (such as utilities and insurance), to continue our wonderful programs and activities. If we do exceed our goal, we may be able to say "yes" to more of the funding requests that came in this year, and we will be in an even better position to respond to the unexpected next year.

Social Justice

At our May meeting, Wednesday May 10 @ 7 pm, the entire congregation and all our friends are invited to hear an important speaker, Eli Moore, from the Othering and Belonging Institute (OBI) at UC Berkeley as he shares creative possibilities for UUCB's involvement in our local communities.

The OBI describes its purpose: "Belonging is the solution. The Othering and Belonging Institute at UC Berkeley advances groundbreaking approaches to transforming structural marginalization and inequality. We are scholars, organizers, communicators, researchers, artists, and policymakers committed to building a world where all people belong."

According to the OBI website, "Eli Moore is Director of the Community Power and Policy Partnerships Program (formerly the California Community Partnerships Program) at the Othering & Belonging Institute. Over the last twenty years, Eli has facilitated numerous <u>participatory action</u> <u>research processes</u> and published various reports and strategy papers that have been cited by local, national, and international media outlets and policy-making bodies. His research focuses broadly on urban planning and policy, political economy, race, and human geography."

As we all know, the UUA – and our own congregation – are encouraging us to Widen the Circle of Concern, which now includes our new ELDT group: Education for Liberation Development Team. As part of these programs, the Social Justice Council is excited to invite everyone to join us on May 10. Mr. Moore will describe some of the work the OBI does, what his own work involves and – of particular interest to UUCB – the possibilities he sees for us to become involved in racial justice issues in our local communities.

"Turning the corner" is a phrase used by many, but it can help boost spirits after a difficult time, assess where you've been and where you're going, summarize a transition period.

When I researched this phrase as a possible theme for this month's Letter from the Board, so many synonyms popped up: overcome, rebound, recover, recuperate, advance, better, boost, correct, develop, enhance, lift, progress, promote, raise, reform, revamp, revise, rise.

Well, it seems that our congregation has turned several significant corners lately. We successfully debated the Future of Freestone, found a new Ministerial Candidate, balanced a budget, and began the process of emerging from a Global Pandemic as the Opening Task Force successfully completed its task and adjourned.

Although each is equal in its significance, I would like to look at two of these corners turned.

The Future of Freestone was decided after Reverend Michelle's extensive outreach to engage the entire congregation in a widespread fact-finding process, which included not just data but was balanced by the emotions allowed to be expressed. The Board provided guidance and a well-navigated Congregational Meeting was held. (Special thanks for Stephanie Ann Blythe, our Parliamentarian). The congregation engaged in productive dialogue that allowed every single person the opportunity to speak. Nominations for the Freestone Oversight Committee are being considered as you read this. This is a monumental corner turned, which is not just about Freestone, but reaffirms how we make decisions as a congregation: inclusively, unafraid of differing viewpoints expressed respectfully.

Finding a Ministerial Candidate was also monumental. Special thanks to the Search Committee! I must admit my first emotion after realizing that I myself, as a congregant, would not know the outcome of the search until it was revealed to all was ... fear ... "what if I don't like the choice?" But then I looked again at *who* was shepherding the process and all doubts melted away. The most trusted members had been chosen to represent my individual interests. And they did not fail. Marcus is an outstanding candidate. My own personal corner turned where I let go, and trusted.

And the discussion of the items above have not closed. "Turning the corner" does not mean "closure." None of the synonyms listed reflected stasis. Turning the corner is a dramatic and vibrant process where we enhance, promote and lift.

Langston Hughes wrote: "When you turn the corner, and you run into yourself, then you know that you have turned all the corners that are left." We turned every corner together.

Board of Trustees April 2023 Actions

- 1. Freestone: Recognized the respectful work of everyone at the March 26 congregational meeting. With the congregation approval of Resolution 22-1, the Board initiated a call for suggested names for appointment to the Freestone Oversight Committee (send to president@uucb.org), for Board consideration at its May 3 meeting. Time sensitive vacation rentalrelated permit fees will also be addressed on May 3.
- 2. COVID-related policies: Received final report, including survey results, from the Opening Task Force – with recommendations to discontinue vaccination requirement, require masking in the Sanctuary only, and to support Sunday sign-in; the Board will act on these on May 3.
- 3. **Parsonage**: Authorized up to \$88,000 from the Cope Ministerial Housing Fund for repairs and renovations to the recently-donated (from Jane Lundin) parsonage house in El Cerrito.
- 4. **Nominating Committee:** Approved for congregational affirmation the Nominating Committee members for 2023-24: Lynne Cahoon (continuing), Michael DeWitt, Don Klose, Anita Mermel, Sandy Portillo-Robins, Ariel Smith-Iyer, Terry Stokes (continuing), Andrew Swan, Marta Tobey
- 5. Endowment Committee: Received its report on activities, recommended fiscal year 2023-24 distribution of 4% of fund earnings, totaling \$44,635, and contributions of \$40,000, to the Ladd Griffith Building Fund.
- 6. FY2023-24 Budget: Reviewed draft budget; on May 3 meeting, Board will finalize budget for congregational vote on May 21.

Executive Director Notes

Finally! We have the name of the ministerial candidate! As you can imagine, staff have been anxious to hear who the new person might be, and we are very gratified to hear there's so much support for this candidate.

One of my biggest projects for the past two months has been doing the paperwork and renovating the newly donated house on Lexington Avenue. We understand the candidate has decided not to move into it, so we are beginning the process of looking for tenants. It is a two-story, two bedroom, one and a half bath house that is walkable to El Cerrito Plaza. Please email me if you know anyone interested.

The number of long-term leases and community partnerships continues to grow. The Board directed that we work to help UUCB be seen as a valuable asset to the entire community. We have hosted events such as a Kensington neighborhood disaster preparedness effort, the Kensington Fire District paper shredding, our e-waste drive, and we are working on hosting a blood drive. We continue to have conversations with other local interest groups aligned with our mission to support their efforts.

Many discussions have started regarding improving communications, systems, and processes, and I foresee some real progress in simplifying the way things work at UUCB. When systems and processes are in place and working well it makes everyone's life easier and will hopefully encourage additional participation. The fact that UUCB is seeing an increase in membership, and those new members being excited about participating in our activities, is very heartening. There are new faces every week!

In preparation for the congregational meeting on May 21, I will be hosting two informational sessions this month regarding the UUCB budget. If you are interested in digging a bit deeper into our financial systems and goals, please attend one of these sessions: May 12 at 6 pm or May 15 at 3 pm, both via Zoom. It is my fondest hope that I can present a budget that meets with unanimous approval!

This is an exciting time to be part of UUCB! I look forward to working with the minister chosen by the congregation and am optimistic about the future.

Partner Church

Last month we told you about the upcoming IARF 36th World Congress to take place in Transylvania on September 4-6. We really didn't tell you anything about the International Association for Religious Freedom. The IARF may be familiar to UUCB's elders, but younger generations may need a brief primer:

"The IARF was established in 1900 as the world's first international interfaith organisation and brought together representatives of liberal religion from different traditions, cultures and continents. Currently it has over 40 members, religious communities, educational institutions and others, in Africa, America, Europe, the Middle East as well as South and East Asia. They represent such diverse religious traditions as Buddhism, Christianity, Hinduism, Islam, Judaism, Native religions, Shintoism, Unitarianism/Universalism, Zoroastrianism and others. The World Congresses have been organised every three or four years for a number of decades to gather members of the IARF and others around a topic relevant to people of (liberal) religious convictions in order to facilitate dialogue, learning, exchange and collaboration between individuals and communities."
