

Board of Trustees April 2024 Actions

- 1. Endowment Capital Projects: Approved repairs/hardware replacement for the black tri-fold doors in the Sanctuary, Atrium, Social Hall, and Fireside Room as the highest priority for the remaining funds. This re-prioritization was recommended by the Buildings & Grounds Committee and the Endowment Projects Oversight Committee to improve emergency/fire safety egress.
- 2. **Nominating Committee**: Approved for May congregational affirmation new members to the Nominating Committee, which is responsible for selecting Board of Trustees candidates.

The World Peace Committee

At recent meetings, our group voted to donate to an organization helping the needy people of Gaza. After research and recommendations, we voted to donate \$2,000 to a non-profit with an excellent record for its years of work in Palestine: PCRF — Palestine Children's Relief Fund (https://www.pcrf.net).

The group also decided to create petitions to be sent to Congressional Senators and Representatives, and to the President, calling for a cease-fire in the Israeli–Gaza war. The petitions were created by Dean Flint and Don Klose, who displayed them in the Atrium on recent Sundays, encouraged all of us to sign and forwarded them to Washington, D.C.

Blessing Bags

We are SOOOOOOOO grateful to all of you who have been so generous in providing toiletries, warm socks (lots of them!), H2O in aluminum containers (NO plastic) and a variety of snacks! Leyla and O'Neill Fernandez from SOS were with us again in March to assemble the second round of Blessings Bags. SOS, one of our Good Neighbor partners, stands for Safe Organized Spaces and brings mobile showers into encampments so that folks have a chance to clean up.

On the same day, Melissa Rosales organized the Religious Ed classes so that our youth would play a big hand in this process. We had a chalice lighting and then went around and shared what we knew about being "unhoused." O'Neill told us his story of working in a restaurant, sleeping in the back at night. What do you know about unhoused people?

We put together about fifty bags; all but five of them were taken by UUCBers to hand out to folks they may encounter at the grocery store, on the street, or ???? Please share your encounter with us.

Climate Justice Committee (CJC)

With Earth Day behind us, CJC will renew a focus on the UUA Green Sanctuary (GS) process, and we'll also prepare to participate in the nation-wide UUA Climate Revival in the fall. GS provides structure, leadership, and support for the UU community to engage in an ambitious environmental and climate justice movement to fully live our principles and achieve a sustainable and just world for all.

The GS process requires us to complete a Congregational Profile (done), an Opportunity Assessment, an Action Plan, and a follow-up report. We need your input for the Opportunity Assessment! CJC members will meet with groups within the congregation to learn your perspectives and ideas. Your input will be incorporated into a congregational action plan. Both the Opportunity Assessment and the Action Plan will be submitted to the UUA GS program for approval as they are completed.

The GS process requires congregations to complete four campaigns, so we'll be asking for congregational input in these areas:

- Congregational Transformation What is the awareness, commitment, and grounding within the congregation for climate and justice work? What are the likely opportunities to increase awareness, collaboration and engagement in transformative climate action? Our work on the UUA Climate Revival campaign will lead directly into our work on the Congregational Transformation campaign.
- 2. Mitigation What is the carbon footprint of our facility? How might we lower it? What are feasible ways for members to reduce their own carbon footprints? How can we work collaboratively in our communities to promote decarbonization?
- 3. Adaptation and Resilience What planning might we do to prepare for severe climate impacts? How might we reduce vulnerabilities and develop resilience in our communities and in our local ecosystems?
- 4. **Justice** How can we collaborate with our neighboring, low-income communities to respond to the disproportionate impacts of the climate crisis they experience?

As we consider opportunities to work on all these campaigns, we'll also consider possible challenges, with both opportunities and challenges included in our Action Plan. We look forward to incorporating your thoughts and ideas into this process.

Voting Justice

There has been such a heartwarming and inspiring congregational response to our Voting Justice project! So far, we have collectively written over

400 postcards to Georgia voters through the UU the Vote campaigns with the Center for Common Ground/Reclaim Our Vote. These efforts focus on empowering Black and low-income voters in voter suppression states. Postcards to voters work — there is good research showing how they increase turnout at the polls. And starting early works — research shows that 80% of voters in the primary go on to vote in the November election. Thank you all for contributing to this hopeful, helpful justice work.

We are now shifting our focus to Virginia, where UU the Vote is reaching out to 336,000 Black voters in 60 counties. For more information about the importance of these counties, see https://www.virginiabusiness.com/article/on-the-


