From the Minister

Autumn is here, and with it a new worship theme for October and November. This season we'll be exploring *The Webs We Weave*, and reflecting on what it means to tend to places where they fray and break. The poet David Whyte often refers to the "conversational nature of reality," that reality is a conversation emerging at the boundary of what you think is you and what you think is not you. Interrelatedness is one of the most fundamental, and in its depths, mysterious, dimensions of existence. It's our interdependence that leads humans to shape systems of justice and governance, that enables profound efforts of cooperation and that leads to the inevitable moments of hurting and being hurt by one another.

We have a rich theological heritage for understanding these dynamics in terms of covenant. But what happens when the covenant gets broken? How do we "promise-making, promise-breaking" creatures (as theologian Martin Buber named us) repair a web that has become so deeply damaged? In Unitarian Universalism we do not have shared rituals of atonement and forgiveness, like T'Shuvah in Judaism, or Confession in Catholicism. With our rejection of traditional theological understandings of sin and repentance, have we also lost practices that enable us to make amends and repair? As we live through a monumental political moment in a society in desperate need of deep repairs, let's imagine what it might take to reorganize our lives and our culture in service of a restorative vision of justice.

Board of Trustees September 2024 Actions

- 1. **Lower Parking Lot/Buildings:** The Kensington Fire Protection District is leaving its lease space in the lower parking lot. UUCB may be able to acquire the storage building, and/or take over the lease of the mobile building for church use and/or rental—or return the area to parking. More research and discussion needed.
- 2. **New UUCB members:** Individual welcome to new members; all new members were invited to attend the Board meeting for introductions.
- 3. **Atrium Task Force:** Rearranging underway in Atrium and Social Hall to address fire and safety concerns and encourage a welcoming feel, along with a new calendaring process for church groups to reserve space for their publicity, information, and related outreach/needs. Thanks to Karen Tripp for the report.
- 4. **Ministerial Housing Fund:** Set a congregational meeting for September 15 for a vote on a loan from the Board-designated Endowment Fund to replenish the Ministerial Housing Fund. On Sept. 15, in a unanimous vote, the loan was approved by the congregation.

Nominating Committee

Becoming a Board Member

Fall is upon us and the turning of the season “calls” us. As VP of the UUCB Board, I have the privilege of “calling” together our Nominating Committee (NC) as we prepare to replace those on the Board whose tenure has come to a close.

There are many approaches as to how each previous NC approached this task. In general, the committee gauges the talent of the current Board and tries to complement that from those within the congregation.

Last year when we were outreaching, several potential candidates replied, “That must be a complicated responsibility”, or “I don’t know anything about being on the Board” or “I don’t have any experience with budgets/group negotiation/Roberts Rule of Order”. (Fill in the blanks with 100 other responses.) Many of us on the Board professed to have had those exact same fears! And it turned out to be so untrue.

I remember during my first year on the Board, I just listened. I absorbed information on the line items of the budget, skillfully guided by our Executive Director and Treasurer. I also learned about all the different committee work, while experienced leaders on the Bylaws & Governance Manual guided all of us. I felt supported and valued during this process, which encouraged me to eventually chime in more often.

I write about this to dispel the myth that being a Board member requires extensive experience in all the details of the church. It doesn’t.

Moreover, our current Board is so well stationed ... and now that Reverend Marcus is with us, the circle is complete! We are a supportive, collegial, respectful body—who have the emotional breadth to agree sometimes, disagree others—but always

coming to consensus. The tone of our meetings (in case you haven't attended recently) is loving and respectful, always knowing that our presence is simply to serve the congregation.

So, I encourage each member to harken my words, to consider a position on the Board at some point in your membership. It enriches your love of this blessed community and gives you an opportunity to lend whatever insights and skills you currently possess.

Partner Church

Your intrepid travelers have returned from Transylvania, where they visited our partner church village of Homoródújfalu and attended the International Convocation of U*U Women. Anne arrived late in the village, so Stephanie Ann enjoyed a few days by herself in Újfalu. That daunting prospect was easily overcome by the warm welcome she received by the villagers. Our interpreter was Birtalan Bence, a young man about to enter seminary to become a minister in the Hungarian Unitarian Church. He was fabulous, as all of our interpreters have been over the years. Once Anne arrived we held a visit with the two village schoolteachers who said that there was a great need for computer equipment in the school. We

then met with the Education Committee and Rev. Gyerő Attila to ask that part of our recent wire transfer for the students be used for purchase of the needed equipment.

We stayed with the Cseke family, Piroska and Josef. They have hosted UUCB visitors many times so they know how to treat us well. When they weren't feeding us, we were treated to wonderful dinners at some rustic restaurants in the Homorod Valley. Stephanie Ann attended a Sunday church service and spoke briefly to the congregation after the benediction.

The International Women's Convocation was held in Kolozsvár, Transylvania's biggest city. Women from sixteen countries attended, including participants from Kenya and the Khasi Hills of India. Many friendships were made or rekindled, especially for Anne with the many Balázs Scholars who were in attendance. One highlight was a performance by a women's choir composed of refugees from Ukraine.

Our space doesn't allow for more details about our pilgrimage. We are planning to make a presentation in Personal Theology on October 27.
