From the Minister

Two enormous metal boxes packed full with lots of little plastic boxes rolled on wheels to the curb of our new home. And from the boxes marched a parade of things, each needing to find a place. Big things marched into empty rooms, rooms ready and waiting for them: a bedroom for the bed, a dining room for dining tables and chairs, a living room for the couch. From some boxes tumbled clothes, warm clothes and light clothes, fancy clothes and simple clothes, each finding a place in a closet or dresser. From smaller boxes came books of every size, each finding the place where it belonged—cookbooks to the kitchen and studious books to the study, while piles of paperback fiction linger still in the corner, waiting to be given a place. Dishes and glasses and cookware, paintings and wall hangings and carpets and the felt piece of a whirling dervish that came from Turkey, vacuum and laundry baskets, an iron without an ironing board—in moving into a new home, nothing is more clear than this: everything longs for a place where it belongs, and every place has something it can hold.

We call the place where we gather a sanctuary because it was made to hold us in our despairs and our hopes, our tears and our laughter. Whatever we are holding, our sanctuary holds us, offering a place where the soul wholly belongs. Sometimes we are the homemakers, giving a place for each thing in the houses that have been built. And sometimes we are the ones tumbling wide-eyed from the boxes, hoping that others have prepared a place for us. As my family and I tumble through our move, I am grateful to be held in the stability of our work together, preparing ourselves to hold a sanctuary open for all in need. Whoever you are this month—homemaker or the seeker longing for home—may each of us find peace here, now, and may all beings find a place of peace.

Can Board of Trustees service inspire spiritual growth?

Community: Common purpose, shared experiences, and camaraderie created with other Board members deepens a sense of belonging in this UUCB community.

Prioritizing values: Should we require vaccinations? What do we do about Freestone? How do we search for our next minister? These types of real Board questions call on us to consider competing values and make choices that define who we are in our individual votes that affect the larger community.

More heads are better than one: Sometimes it's tempting to go it alone, doing things our own way. But Board service teaches how drawing out & tossing around perspectives can create mosaic solutions that are more beautiful, long-lasting, and stronger. There's so much to learn from UUCB-ers!

Contributing to the good of the whole: Where would we be without members willing to do the church’s business/governance work, which admittedly can have a somewhat nerdy whiff to it? It nourishes the spirit to be able to support such church fundamentals.

Being part of making a difference: Building on the work of others, in my tenure my spirit has relished enhanced Board-congregation communication through meeting agenda information, Beacon Board action summaries, virtual Board meetings accessible to all congregants without leaving home, and more.

And that’s the abridged list! I encourage UUCB members who have not yet served on the Board to give it a go and likewise learn, enjoy and grow.

Social Justice Council (SJC)

The Social Justice Council potluck on Sunday January 12 was a rousing success. Over 30 people attended. We held an active and engaged discussion of the incoming administration’s immigration policies and how our congregation might respond to minimize harm to our immigrant neighbors. With the leadership of several SJC members, including Francey Liefert, plans are afoot

for collaborating with local agencies such as the Interfaith Movement for Human Integrity and for developing a new Social Justice Council Sponsored Project focused on support for immigrants in our communities. These plans include the possibility of renewing and strengthening the statement of purpose we adopted as a congregation in 2018 in voting to become a Sanctuary Church:

“As a community of faith, we commit to walk alongside immigrants, mixed-status families, refugees and other targeted communities to uphold the dignity, due process, full acceptance, and participation of all people in our society through advocacy, support, and protection.”

The SJC has been asked to keep the Board of Trustees apprised of these plans and the needs of the SJC as we pursue justice for immigrants. Stay tuned to learn how you can help.

The next SJC meeting will be held by Zoom on February 12 at 7:00 pm.

Our team has been asked to review and test new materials for the UUA's Green Sanctuary program and to report on our efforts to the UUA Green Sanctuary community of congregations. We'll receive some payment for these efforts, and we're planning to support some of our local work with this reimbursement! We were pleasantly surprised at this invitation as we ourselves are working to get our heads and hands around the beautifully comprehensive model of intersectional climate action the UUA has developed.

As we think about taking action on the UUA's Four Essentials of Climate Action, we need to reach out to the congregation to learn what projects you most support and are willing to work on. It will take active participation from many in our UUCB community to develop and carry out the comprehensive effort we need to address

intersectional climate justice in our communities. Our Climate Justice Committee, also working with our wonderful Electrification Committee, will need your help.

With the devastating fires and weather events we regularly see, let's get started and take constructive action out of love and faith for future generations, for ourselves, and for our wonderfully biodiverse web of life.

Freestone Oversight Committee

The Freestone Oversight Committee (FOC) is comprised of Beth Pollard (Board Rep and Co-chair), Tom Tripp (Co-chair), David Wemmer (Freestone Committee Rep), Bob Moore (Freestone Committee Rep), Susan Lankford, and Larry Nagel.

The Freestone Committee has secured donated funds to drill one well where, per geologist subterranean surveying, there exists the likelihood of providing sufficient water to support development on Lots 1 and 2 and therefore the sale of those lots to raise the needed \$250,000. In light of this information, the deadline for raising these funds was extended to April 1, 2025, by the Board of Trustees at its December 4, 2024 meeting.

Timing factors, including wet weather, have resulted in a delay in drilling. The driller reports they need about 7–10 days of dry weather before their equipment can access the proposed well site (due to soft soil conditions) and drill. The Freestone Committee is hoping to have the results of the well drilling available by the February 2025 Board of Trustees meeting.
