From the Ministerial Search Committee

Thank you for participating in our <u>congregational survey</u>, now **extended to Oct 2**. To date 75 congregants have responded, but we are aiming for 150 and hope to hear from as many of you as possible.

Survey responses so far have helped us create meaningful questions for this month's **focus groups and cottage meetings**. These are small group conversations, facilitated by search committee members. Focus groups target specific groups within the congregation, while cottage meetings include congregants from various interest areas. The conversations will explore the same three core questions, providing opportunities to share, listen, and build on what others say with regard to our hopes for a future ministry. We hope that everyone will plan to attend the **Beyond Categorical Thinking (BCT) workshop** Saturday, November 5, 9 am-12 noon! Please RSVP if you can so we can plan refreshments. Childcare is available (with pizza provided!) for families who RSVP. This program is an important tool for congregations to become aware of biases, both conscious and unconscious, around identities our potential minister may hold, including gender and sexual orientation, race and ethnicity, disability, mental health, class, age, size, etc. Sponsored by the ministerial search committee and presented by Keith Kron, Director of the UUA Transitions Office, the workshop is adapted to address the concerns of the congregation.

Opening Task Force (OTF)

357 & 1,300

We so want to be done with Covid, but Covid is not done with us. Latest data from the CDC showed that 357 individuals were dying nationally every day. To put that into perspective, that is equivalent to an airplane crash every day. Last week, in both Alameda and Contra Costa Counties, there were over 1,300 Covid cases. The number does not count the unreported cases of persons who tested positive at home and did not report the test result.

Protocol Update

This is the reality that the OTF considers every time we meet. Although we continue to relax some protocols in a meaningful and safe manner, Covid remains with us and necessitates maintenance of key protocols to ensure we all stay safe and care well for our vulnerable members, so our church continues to be accessible for them. Thus masking, a proven intervention, continues for any activity in church buildings. We will continue check in for participation in a church activity in the building and keep coffee on the Terrace and food consumption outdoors.

Covid Booster

For those who can access Covid vaccines, we all are strongly encouraged to get the latest booster as soon as possible. In addition, there is great concern about the upcoming flu season. Epidemiologists are expressing concerns that this flu season may be worse than previous years – "There is thought we may be facing a more severe flu season because we didn't have as much flu last year," says Clare Rock, an infectious diseases physician and hospital epidemiologist at Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine. "That means some of the natural immunity that would be in the population is not going to be in the population now. We may have more vulnerable people." Experts have advised that you can get your booster and flu shot at the same time.

Hybrid Meetings

Lastly, staff has made significant progress on support for hybrid meetings in the Fireside and Safir Rooms. Scheduling meetings in those rooms on the church calendar enables staff to engage with the meeting organizer on how easily one can arrange a hybrid meeting. From the Board of Trustees

Beth Pollard, President

Living our Covenant of Right Relations – openly, with curiosity for information and compassion for differently-held perspectives – is one aspect of why and how I appreciate UUCB. And now, as a congregation we are experiencing an extraordinary chance as a whole to model our living our covenant while deciding a path forward for our long-held Freestone Retreat property. One of my hopes is to emerge from our deliberation process with bonds that are tighter rather than frayed – increasing the strength and resiliency of our community fabric.

Guided by Rev. Michelle as a key part of her interim ministry, the Board of Trustees and Freestone Committee adopted her six-month+ process leading up to congregants vote on October 23 to set a course for the future of the Freestone property. Congregants have been engaged in visits, viewing information, sharing in a historical timeline and small group sessions – leading up to brainstorming and considering options.

We have asked that you get involved in learning and engaging, suspending any long-held opinions in favor of listening anew to ideas and concerns, studying currentday opportunities and limitations, accepting that certainty is elusive, and discerning what you think is best to serve our mission.

This isn't quick or easy. It IS asking a lot of you, of us. And not just time, but also involving both thinking AND feeling. Thinking – considering UUCB financial, operational, and other business responsibilities and consequences when analyzing and evaluating property ownership and use. Feeling – considering UUCB aspirations, spiritual growth, and emotional connection and relationships.

I was personally inspired by our conversations among members with varying insights and perspectives to Rev. Michelle's thought-provoking questions in our September 17 "world café" style brainstorming. What a chance to learn, explore and expand understanding!

On behalf of the Board of Trustees, I encourage you to be part of Freestone conversations – such as on Saturday October 1 or informally with one another. Let's bolster our connections as we engage and discern with one another, heading into our planned congregational meeting and vote on October 23 about Freestone's future.

Board of Trustees September 2022 Actions

- Freestone: Discussed process and information for congregational discussion and deliberation on the future of the Freestone retreat property, including presentation by Freestone Committee and question & answer period. Congregants strongly urged to view materials via this link <u>https://bit.ly/3LBS3O6</u> and the front page of <u>uucb.org</u> website, and participate in brainstorming and deliberations sessions.
- 2. Account signatories: Authorized signatories on Ministerial Search Committee bank account and all direct investment accounts.
- 3. Housing Allowance: Approved Rev. Michelle housing allowance designation for IRS purposes.
- Capital Projects: Received long-range capital and deferred maintenance needs summary, totaling \$1.9 million.

We've been reporting on the process to re-envision the global Unitarian Universalist community. The Leadership and Design Team of International U/U Collaboration has issued this report on their activities: When a flying trapeze artist leaves one bar for another it is a moment of great excitement and anxiety for those who are watching their act. On the one hand they hope that the gap between A and B will be successfully and gracefully navigated. On the other hand, they are afraid that artists may not grab hold of the next bar successfully.

Similarly, we can imagine that those dedicated to the work of the former International Council of Unitarian Universalists (ICUU) and Unitarian Universalist Partner Church Council (UUPCC) are also both anxiously and excitedly waiting for the newly formed Leadership & Design Team to give direction in this new phase of cooperation within our global Unitarian, Universalist, and Free Church community.

During our initial conversations the Leadership & Design team concluded that a new metaphor is needed. Therefore, we would like to suggest that we take a leaf from the book of the beautiful world of honeybees to imagine the future cooperation in our community. In a honeybee community thousands of bees cooperate in nest building, food collection, and brood rearing. At the same time honeybees are responsible for cross pollination between the dazzling variety of plants that occurs in nature.

We see the community of the honeybee as a call for a new form of cooperation between Unitarian, Universalist, and Free Churches all over the world. We would like to invite you to become a participant rather than a spectator in this process. In this way we can together forge a new kind of cooperation and participation amongst ourselves that will bring new vitality to all involved.
