## From the Minister

The last couple years our family has begun a tradition of a sunrise hike on New Year's morning. It's the one day of the year Henry is excited to hit the trail. We wake up in early dark hours of the morning, brew a thermos of hot chocolate, bundle ourselves in our warmest coats and head to the hills to make the short trek to our favorite little rocky outcropping in Redwood Park where we watch the sun rise.

I don't make it out into the world in those early morning hours very often. Perhaps that adds to the sense of magic they hold for me: a world more serene in its still and quiet waking, before it's had a chance to shower and put itself together. Or maybe that's me who is not yet masked, feeling the air's chill touch on my waking flesh, my eyes discovering a particular intimacy with grass and earth and stone as they adjust to take in the lightening sky.

Our worship series beginning in January is *Real Change is Made by Real People: Joy and Justice in Unmasking the Self*. As we contemplate a new year ahead, and wonder if there are resolutions we will make, or keep, or feel like we should be making but know we're not going to, we find ourselves caught up in that quintessential human journey of searching for self. What if the most important thing we could do, for the quality of our own lives and to help bend the arc of the universe toward justice, was to just be ourselves? What if it wasn't about striving to be better or different, to have or achieve more, but settling more deeply into what we already are? While this paradigm of joy and justice gets us off the hook for all that striving, that's not to say it's easy. The risks are real, but risking being real will make us come alive.

The African American members of this community found themselves locked out of their nearly 200-year-old ancestral burial ground named Love as part of the hidden backlash to the 1960s Civil Rights movement. It is based on the 2007 book Love Cemetery: Unburying the Secret History of Slaves by China Galland.

# Freestone Oversight Committee

Freestone Oversight Committee (FOC) members: of Beth Pollard (Board Rep), David Wemmer (Freestone Committee Rep), Alan Davis (Freestone Committee Rep), Tom Tripp, Susan Lankford, and Larry Nagel. The FOC actions for December 2023 include:

- The FOC agreed to recommend to the Board of Trustees at the January 10, 2024 meeting to approve the Freestone Committee's request to list Parcels 1 and 2 with a Coldwell Banker agent in Sebastopol. This listing probably will go onto Multiple Listing Service (MLS) in January 2024. (Parcels 1 and 2 are the two undeveloped parcels outside the entrance gate to the dome. Parcel 4 is the developed parcel which contains the dome, a well, a septic system, and parking lots).
- The FOC decided to delay approving a new survey for a couple of months in case the Contingency Loan Fund is needed for something else. This survey is a lot line survey to clarify the location of one of the property lines and may be necessary to resolve the encroachment issue with the neighbors at the Villa (our neighbor downhill from the dome).
- The FOC has been monitoring the Conservation
   Easement application process. A Conservation
   Easement is governmental compensation to a
   landowner for permanently foregoing development
   on environmentally sensitive property. The Freestone
   Committee is now officially in the grant application
   process and applied on December 13, 2023, for an
   Agricultural Conservation Easement Program (ACEP)
   2024 grant through the Natural Resources
   Conservation Services (NRCS) department of the US
   Department of Agriculture. The proposed easement
   includes Parcels 1 and 2 and a portion of Parcel 4
   where the dome resides.

#### **Board of Trustees December 2023 Actions**

<u>Capital Improvement Projects</u>: The Board received a <u>presentation</u> from Tom Tripp, and then approved the following:

With input from the Buildings & Grounds Committee and oversight from Endowment Projects Oversight Committee, authorized the Executive Director to spend up to \$189,419 from the \$758,000 endowment project funds for (1) the replacement of UUCB's private sewer lateral - as required by EBMUD; (2) replacement of the Music Room gas furnace with an electric heat pump; and (3) engineering and preconstruction costs to continue investigation for HVAC & electrical upgrades, including the potential for an all-electric campus.

The congregation has authorized spending up to \$758,000 from UUCB's quasi-endowment earnings on capital projects. The approved projects list is expected to exhaust the remainder of the congregation-authorized funds for capital projects—unless donations are received to offset costs.

Please plan to commemorate Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr's birthday with a march and parade from San Francisco Caltrain station to Yerba Buena Gardens, in an exciting event supported by the San Francisco Interfaith Council.

Join thousands in honoring the Selma, Alabama, to Montgomery, Alabama marches and the Voting Rights Act of 1965 by experiencing the MLK2024 commemorative march/parade from San Francisco's Caltrain Station to Yerba Buena Gardens. The march begins at 11 am on Monday, January 15, and participants are encouraged to arrive early. The 1.5-mile journey crosses the Lefty O'Doul Bridge and stops at Willie Mays Plaza at AT&T Park to commemorate the crossing of the Edmund Pettus Bridge in Selma, a symbol of violence and victory in the civil rights movement.

Groups can register and march together at the MLK2024 March Eventbrite page.

At the conclusion of the march, in partnership with the <u>San Francisco Interfaith Council</u>, an interfaith commemoration will bring together the region's faith leaders to commemorate the vision of Dr. King and to lead participants in a spiritual reflection of his message.

Finally, thank you to everyone who participated in reviewing and voting for our Good Neighbor nominees. We have a full calendar of social justice giving ahead for 2024, with organizations that will offer us new opportunities to live into MLK's vision.
