From the Operations Director

The past six months have brought exciting changes to our staff structure at UUCB. As we settle into new roles and build a stronger foundation for our shared work, we want to share a bit about what's new.

Earlier this year, we created a new position: **Operations Director**—a role I was honored to step into in April. We also added a **part-time Administrative Assistant**, combining responsibilities from the former Office Administrator role with communications support. We're thrilled to welcome **Eliza Cantwell** to this position. In addition, we've hired **Rainier Salvador** as our new **Facilities Assistant**. Both of these roles are now 20 hours per week.

Family Ministry has evolved into Congregational Life, led by Rev. Kathryn Jay. Charis Domador now serves as our Membership and Engagement Manager, with expanded responsibilities that include volunteer coordination and program support.

In aligning with the UUA's fair compensation guidelines, we adjusted some staff hours. As a result, our overall staffing is now equivalent to **one full-time position fewer** than in the past.

We've posted a new <u>organization chart</u> on our website. A more detailed "who to contact" guide is coming soon. In the meantime, thank you for your ongoing patience as we grow into this structure.

With fewer staff hours, responses may take longer, and **no** facilities staff will be present on Sundays. We deeply appreciate your help with setup, tidying shared spaces, and continuing to live our mission together.

Partner Church

For the past few years, we have been telling you about a restructuring and a re-visioning of the Partner Church movement into a larger global partnership. Now it's all starting to fall into place. The U/U Global Network Founding Document is rather lengthy, so this month we will provide you with the vision:

Our Vision – A U/U Global Network

The U/U Global Network is a collaborative space for Unitarian, Unitarian Universalist, and Free Christian congregations, organizations, national bodies, and individuals from around the globe. It is a platform for collaborative engagement: a space where individuals and communities can come together to share ideas,

co-create projects, share resources, organize events, and support one another in living out their faith.

The strength of the network comes from centering relationships, grounded in shared values and mutual respect. We are committed to decolonizing our practices, affirming diverse theologies and cultural expressions, and nurturing a global ethic of accountability and generosity. Our work is facilitating and connecting, rather than directing; the U/U Global Network will grow and change according to the needs of the U/U communities around the world who wish to connect, learn, and share globally.

We aim to foster deep, sustainable relationships that can in-turn create opportunities for engagement, mentorship, and mutual support. We seek to understand the needs and opportunities that exist within our global faith community, to celebrate the diverse expressions of liberal religion worldwide, and to offer meaningful direction for building community.

In the coming months we will delve deeper into this new way. Here is a link to the full document as well as a link to a video of a panel discussion by some of the principal players. Freestone Oversight Committee

The Freestone Oversight Committee (FOC) is comprised of Beth Pollard (Board Rep and Cochair), Tom Tripp (Co-chair), David Wemmer (Freestone Committee Rep), Bob Moore (Freestone Committee Rep), Susan Lankford, and Larry Nagel. The FOC has the following items to report on from May-June 2025.

- At the April 27, 2025 Congregational meeting, a motion was passed which extends each of the milestone dates in the March 26, 2023 Resolution for ten months. The Freestone Committee will continue efforts to find water on Freestone lots 1 and 2, raise the \$250,000 required for the first milestone of September 30, 2025, and fulfill the other milestones. In the event that the Board of Trustees determines that any of the extended milestones are not met, the Board is authorized and directed to initiate the sale of the entire Freestone property.
- The next step was to drill the second well. This was scheduled for May 5 -7, but the ground was still too moist and soft. The drilling of the second well finally was scheduled for May 27, 2025. Freestone Committee members Bob Moore and Michael DeWitt and Freestone Oversight Committee member Larry Nagel were there to witness the drilling operation. The well was drilled to a depth of 280 feet and unfortunately came up dry.
- The Freestone Committee is considering future steps at this time, including drilling a third well.
