An Update in the Ministerial Search Process

January was a momentous month of emotions—anticipation, elation, joy and sadness. In a jam-packed three-week period, the search team kicked off this stage of the search process with a retreat. We reviewed candidate records and websites, listened to sermons, conducted zoom interviews and spoke with references.

What can we say about the process so far? It has truly been an undertaking, but the highlight has been speaking with the candidates. We wish we could publicly sing their praises and share some of the sermons we were moved by, but we are bound by confidentiality. Their wealth of experience is unparalleled, but their creativity and vision for the future are inspiring. Although we are sad that we could not say yes to them all, we are buoyed by the opportunity to have been given a small peek into their ministry and the gifts it will bring to future congregations.

We now have our 3 pre-candidates! A pre-candidate is a minister who has moved from the initial round of interviews and has been selected as one of the settled search finalists. Each pre-candidate will visit the search teams, secretly visit our campus, and preach at an undisclosed church, called a "neutral pulpit." We look forward to interacting with our prospective ministers on a deeper level during the pre-candidating weekends!

We will be making a presentation to all of you at our upcoming congregational meeting February 12.



Opening Task Force (OTF) Update

Risk Up - Infections Up - New Variant - Ugh!

Boy, do we want to be finished with COVID. But COVID is not listening to us. Its goal is to morph and continue to be a problem for as long as possible and take advantage of any weakness in our public health status.

Thankfully our congregation has coupled its desire to be together with responsible levels of vaccinations and boosters along with masking compliance to be protective of themselves and others, especially our vulnerable members. This compliance and care has made UUCB likely one of the more safe places for large gatherings. The congregation's resilience after three years of this pandemic is commendable. Kudos to us all!

Check-In Improvement – Bar Code Scanner

To make checking in at church events easier, a bar code scanner will be available to use for check in. One only has to pass their bar code on the back of their badge over the scanner and check-in is done. Thanks to Tess O'Riva and the other staff for another improvement in our church COVID lives.

OTF Future – Safety Committee – You Can Help

The OTF is seeing the time when we can stop our three years of bimonthly meetings and activity to help the church gather safely and productively. The future will rest with a reorganized Safety Committee. Its mission will include further management and development of procedures on contagious disease and participation in church activity as well as child safety in church programs, earthquake preparedness, fire safety, and disruptive campus behavior. There are likely several members with talent in these areas that would be valued assets for this committee. Board Service: A Chalice Circle of Leadership

Over my 35 years at UUCB, I was often asked to consider running for the Board, but I resisted citing my family and work life. I thought it would take too much time, be too contentious and separate me from my close friendships with other church members.

Each new Board year begins with an initiation of new members with a Chalice Circle-like introduction of each to one another. Each member speaks without interruption, without questions, for an extended period of time. This powerful process allows each of us to express something deep about our values, our involvement in UUCB and our aspirations for the connections among ourselves on the Board.

Each year we repeat this introduction among all the Board members only now via Zoom. These very intentional introductions set the tone for Board meetings that are equally intentional. We each come more prepared both inwardly and outwardly to set aside our other concerns and be with one another to focus on our work.

Together with the executive sessions that precede the regular Board meetings, each of us dedicates three to three and a half hours once a month plus additional time for our preparation and committee liaison work. Agendas and preparation by everyone allow each of us to be heard, sometimes at great length and other times just briefly. But after three years of these meetings, they have a flow and connection that keep us all engaged.

In reflection, I realize our meetings have become almost a spiritual experience for me. I see the little Zoom squares with my colleagues and members of the Church, and I recognize that I am in a uniquely gathered space.

Board service has helped me appreciate a deeper way of connecting. Truly listening, pausing, not reacting but processing, then expressing our considered thoughts, engaging from a position of trust with one another reminds me that Board service has been a privilege to share.

At UUCB, we use the word "stewardship" in reference to our annual pledge campaign, but we practice stewardship throughout the year by caring for our human and material assets in countless ways. For example, we practice stewardship when we fairly compensate our talented, committed staff, and when we volunteer for work parties and pull weeds on church grounds. We practice stewardship when we upgrade our bathrooms, improve the ventilation in our sanctuary and social hall, and when we offer religious education and OWL classes to our youth.

Why do we do all this? I believe we give our time, talent, and treasure because we believe that our mission, our congregants, our staff, our youth, and our facilities are worth caring for and preserving.

UUCB's annual stewardship campaign will formally kick off on Sunday March 5. As you make your pledge, we encourage you to be as generous as your budget will allow. Increases of 9% or more will allow UUCB to keep up with inflation and continue all our amazing programs. Member pledges, which make up 40% of UUCB's revenue, are vital and allow us to do many things, such as:

- 2. Retain our highly talented staff by continuing to provide fair wages and benefits.
- 3. Offer the engaging youth religious education programs that Heaven Walker, Director of Ministry and Lifelong Learning, jump-started this fall.
- 4. Provide UUCB and our community with exciting adult education programs (such as Personal Theology and the Literature, Film, Drama and Music Contingent)

5. Continue UUCB's amazing music programs that enrich our services and satisfy our souls.

It feels like things are ramping up without actually ever calming down!

Brief report this month:

- 1. The Board mandate that UUCB use its space for the benefit of the congregations and broader community is moving along nicely. Donation-based Tai Chi classes are offered on Tuesdays and Fridays at 10:30 both days. The E-waste drive is schedule for March 5-12. We are working on a Blood Drive.
- 2. We are expanding our long-term leases as much as possible. We are currently in talks with Trackers Earth to use our site as a pick-up/drop off site for their summer camps and potentially additional classrooms in the Fall.
- 3. The Green Sheet process, reported to the Board in December, is ready to roll out! Please complete this form with as much information as possible and a staff member will reach out if more information is needed. - 4. Financials for the Fiscal Year ending 6/30/22 and year-to-date 12/31/22 will be reported at the February Board meeting. It was a long process to get everything updated after the audit. We will transition to our new accounting firm 2/1/23 and look forward to timely reporting!
- 5. We received a \$20,000 grant from the UUA Disaster Relief Fund to assist us in removing the fallen pine trees, repairing the broken fence, and hopefully removing more dead pine trees!
- 6. The East Bay Amateur Radio Club will host a Winter Field Day on January 29 before services. Come learn more about ham radio and disaster resilience!

This is what I'm saying to comfort myself as I watch the death tolls rise in 3 mass shootings in the first weeks of January. As I watch people dying for no reason at the hands of madness, I ask myself what can be de done? My husband is going to a funeral of a man that died on the streets of a drug overdose. How do we, people seeking a more just world, respond? I made peanut butter and jelly sandwiches to be given out to folks living on the streets of Oakland. A friend is writing political leaders asking them to create stricter gun laws. Another friend is seeking climate justice, another is demanding reproductive justice... You get it, the list goes on. We do what we can. You never know what action you take that makes a difference in a person's life. Puts food in a belly, stops a bomb cyclone so a man is warm and dry and not stressed and frustrated, no gun is to be had for an angry person to pick up: all these can change the course of a person's, as well as a community's, life. Whatever you are doing, my friends, is the right thing. Just keep doing it with the intention of making a difference. Send out love with those letters, those sandwiches, those bottles recycled and those smiles and kind words to a stranger. Just keep on keeping on and have faith you are making a difference.
